



## **COVID-19 SAFETY**

**MASK** (Students are responsible for providing their own mask)

- Students/staff members are required to wear a mask while:
  - traveling on a school van
  - in the hallway
  - in the classroom when social distancing is not possible

## **SCHOOL VANS**

- Drivers will check temperatures before students enter the van.
- Students and staff are required to wear a mask while traveling on the van

## **DAYCARE / ELEMENTARY / HIGH SCHOOL**

- Check temperatures as students enter buildings, must be below 100.04 to enter
- Water fountains will be disabled
  - Students will be allowed to bring a clear container with a screw-on lid with water. Teachers will have bottled water to refill containers for students.
- Bathroom breaks
  - Elementary 3 students in restroom at a time
  - High school 4 students in a restroom at a time
- Mask are suggested, but not required
- Students are to sit as far apart as possible in the cafeteria
- Teachers will clean high touch area during the day
- Temperature will be taken of a student that looks or feels ill during the day

## **ELEMENTARY**

- Use hand sanitizer often
- Disinfect desk and classroom multiple times daily
- Desk will be moved as far apart as possible
- Students K-6th will wait in rooms to be picked up until called to leave for the day

## **HIGH SCHOOL**

- Hand sanitizer will be used by all students as they enter and exit a classroom
- 7th – 9th grades will dismiss to go to lockers and restrooms on first bell each period
- 10th – 12th grades will dismiss to go to lockers and restrooms on tardy bell each period
- Desks will be placed as far apart as possible. Smaller classes will sit as far apart as possible.

## **CAFETERIA**

- Workers will wear masks and gloves
- Students will be handed their food and drinks in individual containers
- There will be no salad bar. Workers will prepare a salad if ordered
- Students will be separated as much as possible

All of these procedures are fluid and may be changed or modified before or after school begins. There may be more guidelines given by the CDC or Mississippi State Department of Health that could change what is allowed or recommended.
